
In memory of a true engineer, teacher, scholar, and friend of every student . . . PROFESSOR JOHN A. WEIR








Within its halls the engineer of the future comes in contact with those who will guide his training toward the time when, as a graduate, he will leave the campus to claim his place in the engineering world.
















Conference and State Champions was the record piled up by the hard driving 1938-39 Miner basketball team, a record for every other
